Tecate is known throughout our region as a friendly small town and as a community that values nature with a colorful cultural life and innovative programs. Fundación La Puerta has worked for nearly fifty years to nurture and preserve these qualities; a dynamic process amidst the chaos, contradictions and vitality of a border town.

I am proud to report that in 2023 we fully recovered from Pandemic restrictions. Parque del Professor, the beautiful park that we created and have maintain for the families of Tecate since 1989, continues its work of building community. Over 100,000 people visited Parque del Profesor in 2023, participating in workshops, hiking the nature trails, playing soccer and attending our festivals.

Four thousand elementary and preschool children attended our environmental education and gardening workshops, learning that we live in an inter-dependent world that we must care for and share with other living beings. Our youth leadership programs nurture a feeling of identity, community and responsibility through teambuilding, ecosystem restoration, investing in the health of our river, in the way we communicate, and in the dreams that we nurture.

Our seasonal festivals brought learning, connection and joy to the lives of families in Tecate, attended by 15,166 people.

Our work has grown beyond bringing young people into relationship with the natural world, teaching them to act responsibly, to care for their own bodies and to be stewards of their community. We are sowing seeds that are transforming our city and we are shaping culture through collaboration, education, vision and leadership.

We hope that you will be inspired as you read about our accomplishments in 2023.

Children

Children are the heart and soul of our future, and nurturing their connection with nature is essential for **fostering a generation** that values and protects the environment. At **Las Piedras Environmental Education Center**, we are dedicated to providing a transformative experience for young minds.

Our little ones first come in pre-school: pulling a carrot out of the family garden, making a rainbow colored salad and eating edible flowers; they learn about phytonutrients and how plants grow and feed us. They return throughout elementary school on field trips, becoming friends with our chapparal ecosystem. Learning how we breathe with our plant kin, how soil is made, how animals adapt to our long dry summers. And they slip into Las Piedras and feel the cool tunnels and shimmering colors of this magical classroom. They imagine being something small, a scarab beetle or a stink bug in the vast network of lives that live unseen and unnoticed in the city.





Workshops at Las Piedras provide school children with hands-on learning experiences. One of our key objectives is to enrich the school system's curricula by providing educational materials, activities, and training to enhance environmental education. Workshops encompass ageappropriate topics including the water cycle,

climate awareness, the value and importance of trees, healthy habits to reduce our carbon footprint, recycling, and a basic knowledge of local plants and animals.

By fostering a sense of place among the citizens, our workshops educate and inspire the people of Tecate to respect and care for their immediate natural environment, the chaparral ecosystem.


Environmental Educational

Curriculas

In this curriculum, children embark on an exploration of their local ecosystem through interactive and educational activities. They uncover the rich tapestry of living and non-living elements, along with cultural and social interactions within this natural sanctuary



Seeds of Awe

In this workshop, young ones take their first steps into organic horticulture and healthy eating. The aim is to cultivate an appreciation for nature through hands-on experience with the soil and its fruits, promoting both health and spiritual delight.



Tree of Life

Through these activities children discover the importance and value of trees and explore the metaphor between personal growth, a forest, and a community ecosystem. This workshop fosters a feeling of reverence for all that trees contribute to our lives.



Water's
Journey

Through this workshop, children explore the importance, uses, forms, and composition of water through engaging activities. The goal is to encourage reflection on their daily actions and how these impact water quality and the sustainability of this essential resource.

Municipal Science Fair

The competition to award the best science fair projects in the city, brought more than 30 innovative sustainable prototype projects presented by 7th and 8th graders to Parque del Profesor. These projects, representing the best of 30 schools, were evaluated and awarded by specialists in science and technology, in order to foster innovation and encourage environmental awareness among young students.

Youth

Through personal growth activities, community service, environmental care, and nature appreciation, young leaders develop creative, responsible solutions to address social problems and environmental challenges.

Volunteering fosters awareness, develops skills, and empowerment. Our youth become agents of change for the benefit of their community.

Youth Leadership and Volunteer program

This program serves youth aged 14 to 21. Our youth learn to work together, and imagine changing the world, cleaning trash along the river, feeding the homeless, supporting veterinarians during our free spay and neuter clinics, devising ingenious ways to reuse, recyle and renew.

They journey from "me" to "we", the empowering, enlivening experience of working together for a common goal. And they have fun, being generous, kind, and playful with each other; a skill set that seems to be disappearing in this time of reactivity, dissent and conflict.



The Park

Named after Prof. Edmond Szekely, co-founder of Rancho La Puerta, Parque del Profesor is a **28-acre community oasis** attracting 100,000 annual visitors. It's a unique venue in Tecate, **providing a natural environment for families** to connect.


The park features intimate classrooms and a plaza for events, plus a mile-long trail offering views of Mt. Kuchuma and an intact chaparral ecosystem.

Workshops and programs inspire and educate in this beautiful setting. The park's mission is to provide Tecate with a safe space that enhances community engagement through recreational, cultural, and health-promoting activities, improving quality of life for all.

















Daily life at the Park

Working mom's and dads come early to walk in nature, to jog on the trails, and on weekends the park fills with families; at soccer games, festivals, yoga classes, gardening and art classes. Every saturday our family gardening program is fully enrolled with a waiting list, these families are eager to begin growing food in their homes and communities.

The Park **provides a beautiful setting** for engagement photos, anniversaries, quinceñeras, graduations and weddings. Mercadito Cuchuma, a monthly craft fair, supports local craftsmen and cottage industries.





Community

Our city-wide campaigns have led to the preservation of the Tecate River, established community gardens provided urban planning for a green corridor along the Tecate River which is now home to Tecate's museums and performing arts center. We have sparked partnerships and woven networks with other organizations to preserve and protect our diminishing wild spaces.

For twenty five years, Fundación La Puerta has worked with neighborhood and community groups leading river clean ups, participating in citizen's committees to protect the watershed and monitoring policies that effect the natural environment in our watershed.


As a key tributary of the Tijuana River, the Tecate River faces considerable **impact from industrial and urban growth** with more than 50% of Tecate's wastewater entering the river channel untreated.

Homeless encampments within the river corridor are a new challenge for Tecate. Parks and walkways, seven miles of urban river once free of trash, are no longer healthy or safe.

These conditions require a **coordinated effort** between civil society, business and the city government.

In 2023 we

- organized visits to the San Diego River Park Foundation and Santee,
- generated exchanges with USD, UCSD
- supported local environmental organizations.
- presented at three conferences in major cities in Mexico
- participated in urban planning policies through official channels such as El Comité Especial del Río.

2023 was a **year of collaboration**. Through new alliances with the UABC, the state university system in Baja California, and many other institutions, we are **addressing urgent issues** in our community. Tecate is experiencing new levels of homelessness, insecurity and a decline in basic services such as sanitation, waste collection and water quality. Together we are able to **create synergies** to address these issues.




